

The Montauk Indians also have a case on the calendar under the title of Eugene A. Johnson against the Long Island Railroad Company. This new suit is in the form of an ejectment proceeding. The plaintiff is a clergyman and one of the few full blooded Montauk Indians who will survive. The action is brought in his name because the appellate division made a decision holding that the tribe, as such, has no legal status. Upon that ground the original suit, in which the Indians endeavored to regain possession of about 9,000 acres on Montauk, valued at about \$500,000, was defeated a short time ago. The style of the original action was "The Montauk Indians, by Wyandank, their chief and king, against the Long Island Railroad Company." The attorneys for the Indians are Secti & Treadwell of Manhattan.
